


Each year AWS Foundation is proud to present our community report and share what has been accomplished. This year, we add a bit of play and symbolism in our story telling through origami.

Building a space for everyone.



Imagine an inclusive community where people with disabilities are able to thrive — what would it look like? Chances are it would look a lot like the future home of AWS Foundation.

In May 2019, we broke ground for our new office building located at 5323 West Jefferson Boulevard in Fort Wayne, IN. The universal design of the 7,800-square-foot facility empowers people of all abilities to work and move about independently. It will also be a model for our region of an accessible, sensory-friendly conference and training area.

There are thousands of programs, services and experts throughout Indiana who are ready and waiting to help people with disabilities improve their quality of life. But these resources are useless if the people that need them the most are unable to connect with them, or are unaware that they even exist.

In 2019, AWS Foundation continued to collaborate with nonprofit organizations across the state and State of Indiana representatives to create Indiana Disability Resource FINDER, a free,

easy-to-use resource designed to give people with disabilities 24/7 access to potentially life-changing community resources.

FINDER collects and organizes the contact and service information from

organizations and individuals who can help people with disabilities and their families to deal with everything from basic needs, insurance and equipment to education, employment and transportation. Social concerns, including bullying, sexuality and inclusion are also addressed. On March 21, Indiana's Lieutenant Governor, Suzanne Crouch, helped AWS Foundation introduce FINDER to communities across Indiana and completed the website's first official search for disability-related information.

"The idea of having one central database for all of us to contribute to and access timely, accurate information is a breath of fresh air," states parent and advocate Kelly Pence.

At the beginning of the 2018-19 school year, there were over one hundred unfilled special education positions in public schools throughout Indiana. We knew something needed to change. So we launched several efforts to help build a deeper pool of professional special education talent that will last for years to come.

The Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) convention is a chance for special education professionals to share ideas, learn best practices and collaborate with colleagues. AWS Foundation scholarships enabled 25 special educators from northeast Indiana school districts to attend the 2019 CEC Convention. In addition, through a matching grant, school districts were provided the opportunity to send general education staff to learn more about inclusive practices.

In 2018 AWS Foundation created a scholarship endowment at Community Foundation of Greater Fort Wayne for special education teachers seeking

master's-level or additional certifications in hard-to-fill specialties, including intense intervention, blind low vision and school psychology.



Additionally, we targeted undergraduate as well as nontraditional students who are interested in special education careers. With our fund at Questa Foundation, 30 qualifying students who declared special education as a major will receive funding for their education. In return, these students commit to teaching special education in northeast Indiana schools for a minimum of five years after graduation.



Fold your way to origami royalty - just do what we do:



We all know that work provides the money we need to support ourselves and our loved ones. But for people with disabilities, work provides priceless opportunities that many take for granted – independence, a sense of accomplishment and social inclusion. That's why AWS Foundation commits funds to support learning programs designed to give people with disabilities the career skills they need to find meaningful employment in our communities.

Gigi's Playhouse provides free, therapeutic, educational and career training programs to people with Down syndrome. In 2018, they requested funding for young adult career development. We are honored to support their small group skills instruction, health and wellness and career skills programs.

In 2018, we were also presented with an opportunity to support Lutheran Social Services of Indiana's (LSSI) "Lasting Success and Stability for Individuals Works" workforce initiative. Through a grant, we helped cover the cost of their unique employment training for people with disabilities who are motivated to establish a career path. By providing personal and professional training, financial education, employment matching and ongoing support, the LSSI Works initiative helps candidates answer the questions, "How do I survive today?" and "How do I contribute to the world around me?"

In Spring 2019, we celebrated with The Boys & Girls Clubs of Fort Wayne, as they moved into their new Fairfield Avenue Clubhouse. The 41,500-square-foot facility boasts many new amenities, including additional activity spaces, a gymnasium, elevators, a media room for tech-savvy teenagers, and a family restroom on each floor.

Beyond the physical space, our funding of an Inclusion Specialist will play an important role in training staff and to help create and implement plans that further enhance inclusion and diversity programs.



In an effort to open the clubhouse to every child, the new facility features an A+ rated inclusive playground, wider interior doorways, smooth flooring transitions, automated doors and quiet areas. Through an AWS Foundation grant, a sensory integration room was added, as well as a large entrance canopy outside

The new clubhouse serves 2,000 children, including more than 135 who have a disability. We were excited to join this effort to give children of every background and ability the opportunity to learn, play and grow.



Sometimes big ideas just need a little boost. That's the idea behind AWS Foundation's Mighty Money grants. These grants provide up to \$2,500 to not-forprofit organizations in northeast

Indiana who have inspirational ideas with the potential to make a major difference. The modest amount allows us to simplify the application process and give approval within 30 days. Of the 97 grants awarded in 2019, 27 of them were Mighty Money grants. Here are just two examples:

"Art should know no limitations and should be able to be experienced by all," says Alexandra Hall, coordinator of Fort Wayne's Art This Way downtown wall mural program. We couldn't agree more. We awarded a Mighty Money grant to the Art This Way program to install inclusive signage on five of the Art This Way murals in downtown Fort Wayne. The new plaques hang at an accessible height and feature a 3D-printed, tactile model of the artwork, as well as QR code access to an audio file of the artist describing their work.

Election Day is an opportunity for everyone in the community to make their voices heard at the polls, but for

people with disabilities, simply getting out to vote can be an insurmountable obstacle.

We provided Fort Wayne's Citilink with

a Mighty Money grant so their buses could operate fare-free from 5:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. on November 2018 Election Day.

Art entertains, educates and inspires – it adds immeasurably to our quality of life. When we learned that Arts United was raising funds to make their historic Louis Kahn-designed building accessible to everyone in northeast Indiana, we knew we had to be a part of it.

"Life is what you make it." We believe this applies to anyone, regardless of age or ability. AWS Foundation grants are regularly committed to supporting local life-enrichment programs and activities that promote emotional, spiritual, social, physical and educational health – 2018 was no exception.

For the fourth year, an AWS Foundation grant was used to support Fort Wayne Youtheatre's Backstage Insight program. This program provides students

with disabilities and their families the opportunity to experience theater together. Creative drama classes and workshops in schools, as well as monthly classes at Brightpoint and Camp Red Cedar, are exposing students with disabilities to the full theater experience. Backstage Insight also invites students backstage at Fort Wayne Youtheatre's spring production

for a behind the scenes look at props, scenery, lighting — and a chance to meet the actors before the performance.

Fort Wayne Ballet received a grant to support sensory-friendly productions of *Cinderella* and *The Nutcracker*. The performances removed pyrotechnics and flashing light effects. Loud noises

were shortened to a comfortable length for those with sensory challenges. These simple modifications allow for all family members to enjoy the performances together.

AWS Foundation camper scholarships to Summer at Last Teen Camp, Camp PossAbility, Camp Red Cedar and Kosciusko Community YMCA SOAR Camp give campers of all ages and abilities access to a fun, safe way to discover exciting new activities. These grants offer opportunities to continue to build daily skills that may otherwise erode over the summer months.

Building houses that feel like home.



At the end of the day, everyone wants to come home to a safe and comfortable place. For people with disabilities who deal with obstacles all day long at school, work and play, it is vital that their home meets their personal needs.

In 2018, we worked with several northeast Indiana organizations to ensure that home is sweet for everyone.


The Neighborhood Homes & Apartments is a city- and state-supported affordable housing project developed by Stop Child Abuse & Neglect (SCAN) and Biggs TC Development. It represents 25 single-family rent-to-own homes. With the support of AWS Foundation, construction was initiated on 12 homes modified with self-closing doors, motion sensor faucets, visual doorbells and smoke detectors, along with other amenities designed to assist those with disabilities.

But we didn't stop there. We also teamed up with Mustard Seed Furniture Bank to help expand their outreach to the disability community. With support from AWS Foundation, Mustard Seed continues to fill requests for household furniture, cookware, bedding and more for people with disabilities as they transition into independent living.
